Wrapping Christmas parcels

Get festive while children develop fine and gross motor skills by wrapping parcels. It's a great activity to encourage early mark making and to support the use of mathematical language too.

Learning aims

- Develop fine and gross motor skills
- Develop early mark making and early writing
- Use mathematical language to describe the different size, weight and shape of parcels
- Explore capacity
- Talk about their own experiences.

Resources

- A selection of boxes of different sizes and shapes
- Padded envelopes, Christmas wrapping paper, brown paper
- Bubble wrap
- String, tape, staplers, glue sticks
- Scissors
- Sticky address labels
- Pens
- Stamps and inkpad
- A basket of items to wrap (dolls, teddy bears, games, etc.)
- Weighing scales
- Copies of the nursery address or children's home address.

Activity outline

- 1. Create a Christmas parcel workshop area. Ensure you have a range of different sizes and shapes of boxes for children to explore
- 2. Create stations for wrapping different sized boxes with a range of materials, tape, string, glue stick, staplers, scissors, brown paper, wrapping paper, bubble wrap, etc.
- 3. Work with the children to model how to measure the paper or string to fit the size of the gift, use the tape, write labels and so on





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- 4. Provide address labels so children can write and attach the labels to the envelopes and parcels or thick pens to write on the wrapped parcel
- 5. Give examples of how to write an address for children to see in the space. This could be your nursery address of the children's own home address
- 6. Create a weighing areas (with large weighing scales) for children to record the weight of each parcel
- 7. Encourage children to talk about their own experiences of sending or receiving parcels.

Extension ideas

- Leave the activity resources for children to explore their interest and continue experimenting with different sized objects and boxes
- Use a world globe to discuss how parcels travel all over the world. Find out if children have experience of sending parcels to families and friends in other countries
- Take children on a trip to the post office to send a parcel to your setting, discover how long it takes, how much it weighed and how much it cost. Take photos to create a book for the children to be able to remember and retell the activity.
