Economic Context

Rising costs

- Inflation down to 3.4% and forecast to go below 2% around April
- Food inflation is also down to 4.5%
- Living wage up by 9.8% to £11.44 and applies from age 21
- NDNA member research: Average wage bill increase of 14.4%
- Government has announced index linked funding increases from 2025

NDNA has:

- Given evidence to Low Pay Commission about impact of NLW & NMW
- Lobbied for increased funding, better capital support and relief from Business Rates
- Done research with the sector on rising costs.



Spring Budget Announcements

The Chancellor announced a commitment to increasing funding rates for the coming two years. This covered three elements:

- Additional uplift in funding from 2025/26 for two years to cover increases in inflation and earnings
 - CPI for inflation
 - Average Earnings
 - National Living Wage increases
- The pass-through requirement on local authorities will increase to 97%
 - Timeframe is unknown for this ambition
- Funding rates to providers will have to be published within 8 weeks of the national funding being announced




Spring Budget Announcements

Other relevant Budget 2024 announcements:

- Inflation, which was 11% in Autumn 2022, has fallen to 4% (now 3.4%) and is forecast is to go below 2% around April
- Child benefit threshold changes will apply from April and increase from £50,000 to £60,000. Half a million families will benefit by an estimated £1,300 per household.
- Business rates relief were maintained for pubs and hospitality venues and a 40% relief was introduced for film studios
- National Insurance for employees cut from 10% to 8%



UK General Election 2024




The latest YouGov/Times voting intention poll shows: Conservatives on 19% (-1 on Mid March)
Labour 44% (no change).

Elsewhere, the Liberal Democrats have 9% Greens 8% and Reform UK have reached their highest polling of 15%.

- Education and Schools is a lower priority for voters
- This is why childcare is often discussed as an economic issue




The current policy landscape

- Government expansion planned to children from nine months old
- £4.1 billion additional funding by 2027 and funding for wraparound care in schools
- EYFS reforms and workforce campaigns
- Committed to Government spending plans on early years
- Commissioned a review headed by Sir David Bell
- Pledged a 0 14 childcare offer to families but policy is under review.
- Policy commitment to a Better Start in Life
- Extra funded hours to disadvantaged children and triple the EYPP to £1,000
- Improve qualification take-up and a graduate in each nursery.




for early years



- Responses covering 448 nurseries across England
- Average staffing cost increase was 14.4%
- Average parent fee increase was 8.5%






- 56% have unmet demand
- 54% would need capital support to expand
- 39% are limited by staff shortages
- 48% cannot offer more places to under 3s




- 83% say 3 & 4 year-old rate doesn't cover costs
- Funding shortfall reported as £2.36 p/h per child





- As a result 73% operating at a loss or just breaking-even
- 35% are loss-making which goes up to 50% in areas of deprivation





Coram Childcare Report

- Survey of councils across the UK
- In England councils believe sufficiency is falling across the board
- Sufficiency for children with a disability is just 6%








Should the work of the early years sector be framed as 'early education and care'




Would you support the creation of a single childcare account for families that can be paid directly to providers?





DfE announcement – Parent Applications & Funding Consultation

- Parents of newly eligible children can apply for funding codes for September from May 12
- Childcare Choices has eligibility info including a checking tool
- DfE are warning that many providers have waiting lists so parents should look soon
- Deadline for Codes is 31 August but won't guarantee acceptance
- Providers cannot set a deadline earlier than 31 July for parents to have a code
- Consultation on Childminders also includes questions on funding eg monthly vs termly payments - and closes on 10 May



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


